Asha, in 'Saga-vhala', is as glued to south Bombay as to the TV, and knows more about Bollywood than even judges at a quiz contest. Freny, in 'Her F word', is happily married to a

successful doctor like herself but harbours a secret longing in her heart. And there's Indira, Under Secretary, in 'Women Can't Play It'-not one for playing chess; but the game she is adept at is far more complex and cunning. 'Women are like men, only different, mostly better, ' writes Kiran Doshi in the Author's Note-and then proceeds to show us how in fifteen memorable stories written with quiet, compelling humour and an intuitive understanding of life's little triumphs and troubles and abiding oddness.
